

Genie UK Ltd. Waste Battery Take Back Policy

Genie UK Ltd. is fully committed to fulfil its obligations as a “Producer”¹ of Industrial and Automotive Batteries as described in the Directive 2006/66/EC and the Waste Batteries and Accumulator Regulations 2009.

Industrial Batteries

As a producer of Industrial Batteries under the Waste Batteries and Accumulators Regulations 2009, Genie UK Ltd. produces Lead (pb) Acid batteries, including Wet Cell (flooded) and Absorbed Glass Mat batteries, placed or intended to be placed on to the United Kingdom market this compliance period and over the last three (3) years. We are obliged to take back free of charge, and within a reasonable time, waste industrial batteries supplied to an end user for treatment and recycling. We are required to do this in any calendar year we place new industrial batteries on the market.

Automotive batteries

As a producer of Automotive Batteries under the Waste Batteries and Accumulators Regulations 2009, Genie UK Ltd. produces Lead (pb) Acid batteries, including Wet Cell (flooded) and Absorbed Glass Mat batteries, placed or intended to be placed on to the United Kingdom market this compliance period. We are obliged to collect, free of charge and within a reasonable time, waste automotive batteries for treatment and recycling from final holders (e.g. garages, scrap yards, Civic Amenity Sites, etc.). We are required to do this in any calendar year we place new automotive batteries on the market.

We will agree the necessary arrangements for the return, proper treatment and recycling of the waste batteries.

¹ ‘producer’ means any person in a Member State that, irrespective of the selling technique used, including by means of distance communication as defined in Directive 97/7/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council of 20 May 1997 on the protection of consumers in respect of distance contracts (1), places batteries or accumulators, including those incorporated into appliances or vehicles, on the market for the first time within the territory of that Member State on a professional basis.
